## September Speaker

### Albert Yamasaki

Albert Tamashausky began growing orchids in 1974. He dropped out of a biology program and Kean College (Union NJ) and went to work full time for Lager & Hurrell Orchids, Summit New Jersey. During the two years spent at Lager and Hurrell Albert learned the art and science of orchid potting, vegetative propagation, and general orchid culture. Albert moved to Oxford in 1977 where he grew orchids in a converted bedroom. In 1982 he moved just around the corner and began growing orchids in the lagering cave at the Swartz Brewery.

Albert's formal training is in chemical engineering and material science. He holds a BS in chemical engineering from Lafayette College. Albert is semi-retired from Asbury Carbons were he previously acted as Director of Technical Services and chief science officer.

## Orchid Growing at the Swartz Brewery, Oxford, New Jersey: Adaptation of a 19<sup>th</sup> Century Structure to a <u>21<sup>st</sup> Century Application</u>.

The presentation will describe how he grows miniature

orchids, under lights in the remnants of the historical Swartz Brewery located in Oxford, Warren County, New Jersey. Oxford, NJ is a small town in the western corner of Warren County, and is the home of the "Oxford Furnace", established ca 1741. Oxford Furnace is one of the earliest blast furnaces in the Nation. The Oxford Furnace supplied iron for armaments and utilitarian items for the revolution and Oxford was an iron producing town until the late 1950s. The Swartz Brewery was one of many small breweries that sprung up during the 19th century to provide beer to the local workers and inhabitants.

The Swartz brewery consisted of a main "utility building" and an attached subterranean "cave", 8 feet below the surface that served as a "lagering" chamber for the beer. Albert will describe in detail the layout of the cave, the renovations performed to allow orchid cultivation within the cave, and the unique "cloud forest" environment provided by this underground structure.


Albert will bring for sale: A general mix of miniature species including some from the genera Dendrobium, Bulbophyllum, Masdevallia, Porroglossom, Maxillaria, etc. All plants are 100% grown under lights and are ideal for fluorescent light culture.






This view is looking south on Mercer St (away from downtown Princeton) note the crosswalk just before the entrance to the Parking lot.




This view is looking north on Mercer St (toward downtown Princeton)
